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Arches National Park Timed Entry Pilot Resumes for Labor Day Weekend

Reservations Required: August 28 Through The End of October 2025

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Arches National Park's fourth timed entry pilot program, which was paused during peak summer heat, will resume in time for the Labor Day holiday weekend. Starting August 28th, visitors will need to reserve a ticket in advance in order to enter the park between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. daily through October 31.

Reservations can be made online at www.

Recreation.gov or by calling 1-877-444-6777.

Tickets are available now; additional next-day tickets will be released at 7 p.m. daily starting

August 27. Those without reservations may enter the park before 7 a.m. or after 4 p.m. but may experience additional crowding, especially in late afternoon.

Reservations cannot be made at Arches' entrance booths.

Timed entry reservations are not required for visitors on commercial tours or those who have camping reservations, tour tickets, or hiking or special use permits. Reservations are also not required at Canyonlands National Park.

Both Arches and Canyonlands national parks anticipate a busy Labor Day holiday weekend.

Visitors should expect increased traffic, long lines at park entrances, busy trails, and limited

parking at both parks.

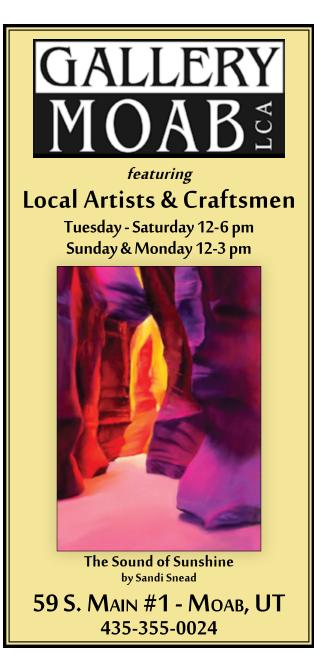
Late summer can bring widely varying weather conditions to the high desert. Plan for your safety by checking forecasts and choosing activities appropriately. On hot days, consume plenty of water and healthy snacks and avoid strenuous hikes and prolonged sun exposure. Carry a headlamp and extra layers, as the sun may set earlier than you expect. If monsoon rainstorms are forecast, avoid travel on unpaved backcountry roads. Lightning can be fatal; seek shelter in a building or vehicle as soon as you hear thunder.

Moab Live Downtown Entertainment Starts Autumn Season

Cooler weather makes outdoor entertainment even better in Moab. Not only are there plenty of natural wonders to see in Moab, there's also fun entertainment available right downtown. If you're looking for something totally different, the Moab Backyard Theater is located right in the heart of downtown. It's open to all ages and great fun for grown-ups and kids alike. Not only is it fun, but all shows are performed without the use of Artificial Intelligence.

The Backyard Theater is one of the only open-air entertainment venues in the west, a throwback to the old west days when traveling shows entertained culture-starved pioneers on the dusty streets of the frontier towns.





Backyard Theater features Magic and Music two nights a week. The stage sits beneath a giant cottonwood tree that is older than the town itself. In its 12th year of operation, the theater has entertained thousands of people from all over the world. They come to see an old-fashioned type of American entertainment that has all but vanished in the rest of the country.

Every Wednesday, there's traditional bluegrass music at the theater. The band Quicksand Soup performs old-time standards and unique originals starting at 7 pm. The free show has become a downtown fixture over the last few years and it's common to see both locals and tourists alike tapping their toes, or even dancing.

On Saturdays, The Backyard Theater feature's the southwest's only outdoor downtown Magic Show, the award-winning magic of Rick Boretti. Rick's hilarious routine changes constantly, but always involves lots of wisecracks and mystifying magic tricks. Folks have been known to return year after year for the show. 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Dark Sky Happenings

The Great Rift

September nights have glorious views of our own Milky Way galaxy under dark skies. For many city dwellers, their first sight of the Milky Way comes during trips to rural areas, so if you are traveling away from city lights, do yourself a favor and look up!

In Moab this time of year, you can see the Milky Way after dark overhead. Photos of the Milky Way are breathtaking, but they usually show far more detail and color than the human eye can see – that's the beauty and quietly deceptive nature of long exposure photography. To observe the Milky Way with your eyes, you need clear, dark skies and enough time to adapt to the dark. Avoid bright lights as they will ruin your night vision, and choose a night with new or crescent Moon; a full Moon will wash out potential views.

Keeping your eyes dark-adapted is especially important if you want to see the dark lane cutting into that haze, stretching from the Summer Triangle to Sagittarius. This dark detail is known as the Great Rift and is seen more readily in very dark, dry skies found in

high desert regions. What exactly is the Great Rift? You are looking at massive clouds of galactic dust lying between Earth and the interior of the Milky Way.

Other "dark nebulae" of cosmic clouds pepper the Milky Way, including the famed Coalsack, found in the Southern Hemisphere constellation of Crux. Many cultures celebrate these dark clouds in their traditional stories along with the constellations and the Milky Way. One such story tells of a Yacana the Llama, and her baby, wandering along a river that crossed the sky – the Milky Way. The bright stars Alpha and Beta Centauri serve as the llama's eyes, with the dark sections representing the bodies of mother and baby, with the baby below the mother, nursing. What do you see in the

The Moab Area Community Land Trust: A Primer Affordable Housing for Locals

Kaitlin Myers, who has headed up the Moab Area Community Land Trust for the last three and a half years, has formulated some strategies that actually work.

A lot has happened since she became the Land Trust's first paid staffer in January 2022. Having served on the nonprofit trust's Board of Directors for several years, and having earned college degrees in architecture and economic development, Myers knows more than a little bit about how houses get built, from the ground up.

She begins by saying MACLT is the "puppeteer" of the five different developers they work with. Myers learned early on that being an architect was not her wheelhouse. "I care more about how people interact within the walls, than how the walls are put together," she tells me.

"Our whole model," she says, "is focused on the land. We first work with developers to make it easier for them to build housing—so we're able to sell the lease on the lot to them." The lease is priced substantially lower than it would be on the open market. And MACLT begins the work by building infrastructure—roads, utilities, garden spots, site planning.

You need land. You need money—starting with a \$4.4 million Federal grant the Land Trust garnered in 2019.

You need an indispensable public partner called the Southeast Utah Housing Authority, to oversee construction and help connect the dots.

You need an 8-member board of directors comprised of an impressive list of high-powered local leaders to help develop priorities.

And then you need something like a spaghetti chart, or as Myers puts it, "red strings on a board" to keep it all straight.

The admitted complexity is needed in order to satisfy a major requirement of the Land Trust's mission, which is to serve a diverse population, and which the land trust believes is key to the sustainability and quality of life here.

Myers points to the spectrum of potential homeowners and renters, their different preferences, household

structures, and income profiles. "It's complicated," Myers says, "but in the end it provides more choice for people who want to live and work here."

The flagship of MACLT's mission is Arroyo Crossing, a 41-acre tract about a mile and a half south of Moab on Spanish Valley Drive. The land was donated to the Land Trust in 2017 and was slated to be the breeding ground for 300 housing units at completion.

Building has been ongoing, with many of the first homes built in partnership with a Moab nonprofit called Community Rebuilds, which oversees construction of affordable strawbale homes in the Moab area (see Non-Profit Happenings, August 2023 issue).

The magic is that homeowners own the homes, but lease the land. This helps to keep the properties affordable, and management under the careful eye of the land trust ensures that there are limits on how much the price of the property goes up over time. "This is my dream job," Myers says. "There is nothing cooler and more personal than your home. What we do provides stability for people who love this community and want to stay here."

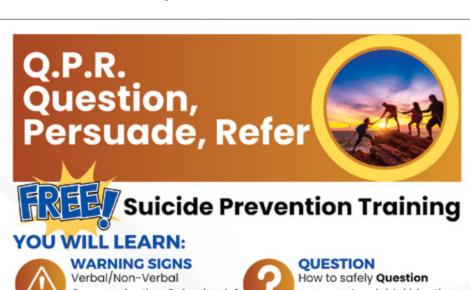

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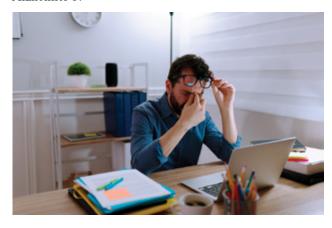
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Brain Fog? Here, Take This Pill

At age 42, Shawn should be at the top of his "A" game. But he isn't. He has become increasingly tired. After dragging himself through work, he just wants to veg on the couch when he gets home. His wife and children have learned not to expect anything from him after work because he is physically and mentally spent. But this isn't the worst of his problems. What bothers Shawn even more is the brain fog. He feels as if his head is full of cobwebs. He can't solve problems like he used to. When he can string thoughts together, it takes much longer than it used to. This makes it really difficult for him to perform on the job. If that's not bad enough, he forgets the names of friends he has known since he was a child. Poof. Gone. To avoid humiliating embarrassment, he just addresses them

"Am I just getting old?" he asked. "Am I getting early Alzheimer's?"

as "Hey, dude..." each time he sees them.



When I completed my training in conventional medicine, the best I could do was to think perhaps Shawn was suffering from depression and prescribe him an antidepressant. Or to say, "Well, Shawn, you're not getting any younger." Because I'm quite a bit older than he is, however, the second answer rings hollow. And the first would only work if he was in fact depressed. But he isn't. He doesn't come close to meeting the criteria for that diagnosis. As tempting as it might be to give him a trial of a drug, hope for the best, and move on to the next patient, this would be a grave disservice to him.

There is simply no drug for brain fog. There is no receptor in the brain to block

or to stimulate to make those cobwebs go away and the neurons to fire as they were designed to. Like so many of the symptoms that plague Americans today, brain fog is no more than a symptom of an underlying dysfunction. Moreover, in all my years of practice, I've never met a patient with brain fog who didn't have several other symptoms to go with it. As a result,



even if there was a magic drug for brain fog, it wouldn't eliminate or even touch any of the other symptoms that accompany it.

Logically speaking, rather than trying to find a pill to control or lessen brain fog, it makes more sense to find out what is causing it and fix that. Some of the well-known hormonal causes include testosterone deficiency, estrogen dominance, hypothyroidism, vitamin D deficiency, and hypercortisolism. Common toxic causes include mercury toxicity, spike protein toxicity, chemical toxicity, mold toxin, sugar, bromine toxicity, and liver toxicity. Infectious causes include Lyme disease, viruses (especially Epstein-Barr Virus and Long-COVID), dental infections, parasites, and yeast overgrowth. Frequent autoimmune causes include Hashimoto's thyroiditis, Lupus, and multiple sclerosis. Nutritional causes include vitamin B12 deficiency, processed foods, and dehydration. Gastrointestinal causes include intestinal dysbiosis, intestinal permeability, and food sensitivities.

Additional causes of brain fog include TBI/concussion, nonrestorative or inadequate sleep, hyperhomocysteinemia, reduced glymphatic activity during sleep, dysautonomia, chronic inflammatory response syndrome, depression, anxiety, chronic fatigue syndrome, and fibromyalgia.

Finally, although there is no drug that takes brain fog away, there are many that cause it. For example, chemotherapy is such a notorious offender that we have a specific term for the condition: "chemo brain". It is also known as chemo fog or chemotherapy-induced cognitive impairment (CICI). This is serious enough that increasing numbers of people with cancer are choosing alternatives

to conventional chemotherapy, including insulin-

potentiated (very low dose) chemotherapy and many other non-toxic options. Seizure medications also well-known causes of brain fog. Because they decrease the energy in brain cells in order to reduce seizure activity, that same decrease leads to reduced thinking power. Other drugs

that cause sluggish brain activity include antihistamines, antidepressants, medications for urinary symptoms, and drugs for nerve pain.

This is just a sampling of the numerous disturbances in your body that can cause brain fog. Even so, testing for each of these conditions would be time-consuming and cost-prohibitive, besides leading to unnecessary delays in

Returning to Shawn, as we discussed more of his history, we learned he had suffered a concussion playing high school football. After sitting out a couple of games, he was allowed to return to play following the official clearance guidelines. Unfortunately, neither his coach, parents, nor doctor realized that just because his symptoms resolved didn't mean the inflammation in his brain had gone away. They also did not know at that time that a single concussion at any time in one's life dramatically increases his or her risk of dementia, especially early-onset dementia. Consequently, part of Shawn's recovery program includes interventions to shut down the inflammation in his brain and restore neuron integrity.

For other men and women, brain fog turns out to be no more than a simple testosterone deficiency. Sadly, we are seeing this earlier in life than we ever thought possible. The toxic, electrical, nutritional, emotional, and infectious assaults on both our brains and our hormones have accelerated in recent years. Identifying and making every effort to reverse them is proving life-changing for many people.

Not wanting to mess with something that isn't yet severe, you might be tempted to say, "It's just brain fog. Everyone my age has it." As tempting as this is, it would be a mistake for two reasons: Although some people your age have it, not everyone does, and it has nothing to do with age per se. Secondly, the same dysfunction that is causing a nuisance symptom today—whether it's brain fog, fatigue, headaches, body aches, heartburn, bloating, or whatever—can at the same time be brewing tomorrow's heart attack, stroke, diabetes, cancer, autoimmune disease, or yes, dementia.

If you are younger than 105 and experiencing brain fog, memory loss, word-finding difficulty, or just not feeling as sharp as you used to be, don't blame your age. If your doctor's best efforts to help you get to the bottom of your problem prove inadequate, don't give up. There are a lot of things your doctor and I were not taught in medical school. 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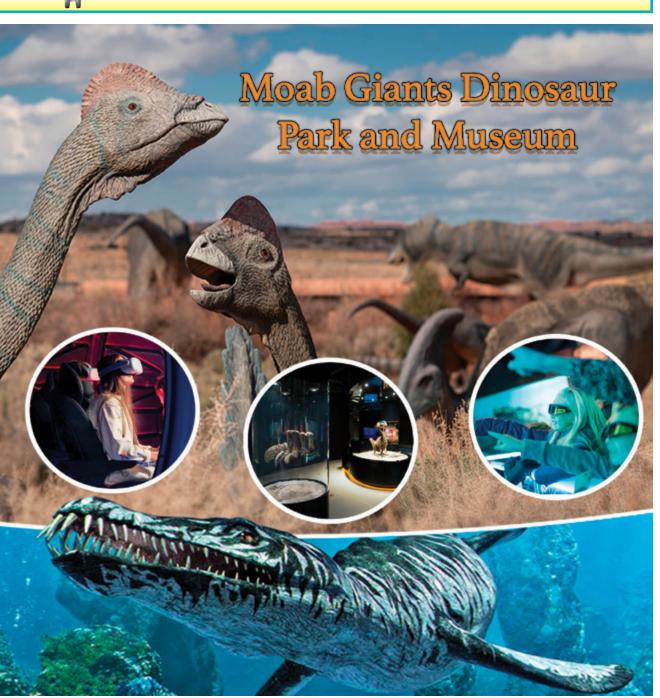

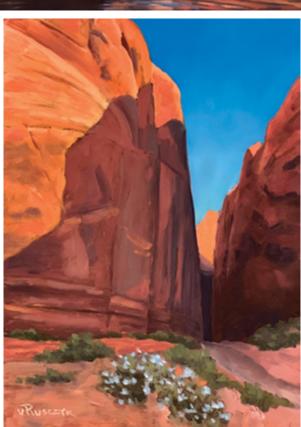
hikes and road trips, along with the native plant species she grows in her garden. While focusing on native plants of California started her art career, her subject

A Cooling Respite on the Manti-La Sal's Devil's Canyon Interpretive Nature Trail

afternoon temperatures in Moab were still reaching into the 90s and 100s, I was looking for some relief. Hiking in a pine forest sounded like just the thing. Driving south from Moab 54 miles on US 191 to Monticello (gaining 3,000 feet in elevation), I proceeded south another 13 miles and turned right/west at the sign to Devil's Canyon Campground (elevation 7,400 feet). The trail begins



After following the Abajo Loop State Scenic Backway 0.7 miles, I turned right/east into the campground, crossed a cattle guard, and turned left/north past the camp host's site to follow the loop for sites #17-41. After less than a mile, I arrived at the very end of the lollipop at site #41

where the trailhead for the Interpretive Nature Trail begins. (For more hiking trails at higher elevations, you can continue on the Scenic Backway around the base of Abajo Peak.)

The trail drops down from the road and begins an easy graveled loop below the camp sites, great for many abilities, including my (human) hiking companion who was recently recovering from

back surgery. Fifteen numbered posts mark information in a brochure available in the trailhead's metal box. The

campground sits in the Manti-La Sal National Forest at the foot of the Abajo Mountains, also known as the Blue Mountains, another Colorado Plateau sky island including the La Sals and the Henrys. Devil's Canyon itself is a rugged serpentine gorge carved into the San Rafael Swell with a drainage that starts near San Rafael Knob (at 7,921 feet, the swell's highest point), cuts through Estrada sandstone layers, featuring pour-offs, tributary canyons, and elevation changes in the canyon floor.

Ancient peoples used many of the forest's natural resources including pine nuts, produced by pinyon pines (Pinus edulis), which were—and are today—roasted and eaten. Tribes also wove the fibrous leaves of the

narrowleaf yucca (Yucca angustissima) into baskets, sandals, rope, and twine, also consuming the stalks, flowers, and buds. The roots were processed into soap and yellow dye to color yarn. The sap of the Ponderosa pine (Pinus ponderosa) was used for glue and waterproofing, and tribal peoples also ground the seeds into flour. The plump, blue female seed cones (misnamed berries) of the Utah juniper (Juniperus Looking down into Devil's osteosperma) were used Canyon



for medicines, its resin for tea and oil, and its droughtresistant wood for fence posts and firewood. The small red fruits of the bitter apple (Peraphyllum ramosissimum) are eaten by humans, elk, deer, and birds for their vitamin C, plus, the sweetened and cooked fruits can be made into jam. Gambel oak (Quercus gambelii), common across the Colorado Plateau, produce acorns, a food rich in fat and protein that can be stored for long periods, and, when by Kathy Grossman

soaked or boiled to remove the bitter tannins, are roasted or ground into flour.

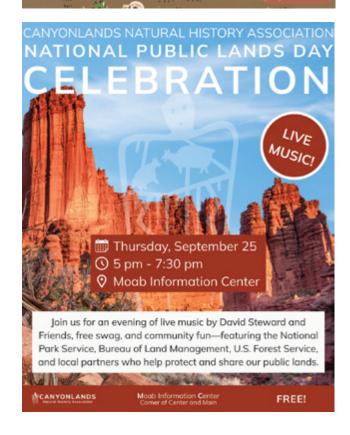
Ancestral Puebloans were in this area from about 50-1300 Common Era (CE). They then migrated away, mostly to what is now New Mexico and Arizona. Tribal descendants such as the Hopi, Zuni, Utes, and Diné still use these forest products. Other informational stops describe lightning strikes, bark beetles, barbed wire, and forest life cycles. A

short side trail from station 11 leads east to a viewpoint of the Bitter Apple Ruin on the opposite side of the canyon. A granary sits in a small alcove high up on a cliff face. (I wish I'd brought my binoculars!) These granaries Devil's Canyon Granary



protected caches of grain, beans, nuts, seeds, and corn from rodents and kept them dry from rains and floods. The harvest I preserved on this day was a refreshing respite from the Moab Valley heat, lovely rich scents of pinyon and Ponderosa pines, and the ssshhhhhhhh of the wind through their needles in this mountain foothill ecosystem just an hour from my desert home.

September Butterflies in Flight

September is a great month to catch the flight of butterflies in red rock canyons or in mountain meadows and summits as the males patrol these hilltops in search of females. This enjoyable butterflying experience is enhanced with distant mountain views, scenic redrock backdrops, and colorful late-summer wildflowers.

250 Over butterfly species have been recorded Swallowtail in Utah, even though southern

Utah represents a bit of a data gap because it has not been surveyed as extensively as other areas in the state. Reporting

sightings to various community-driven databases such as iNaturalist or BAMONA, Butterflies and Moths of North America, are highly encouraged.

Here are just a few of the many butterflies that hikers might encounter on a September hike.

The mourning cloak butterfly, a large dark butterfly, is the Utah State Butterfly. Wide-ranging, the mourning cloak is found in wooded habitats because they feed on tree sap. The common name is derived from the dark

resembling wings heavy woolen cloak that a mourner might wear to a funeral in olden times. A tannish border with small blue dots offsets the dark wings.

Amazingly, these butterflies overwinter as adults, called the "imago" life stage. They find cracks and crevices in old barns, under tree bark, and other Mourning Cloak



protective confines. To avoid freezing, the butterflies produce special chemicals in the circulatory system called cryoprotectants which act like antifreeze agents to protect the butterflies.

Probably the best-known butterfly US-wide is the monarch which shows up in Utah in July. These butterflies are orange with black lines and are fairly large. Tagging projects occur across

track the movements and survival rates of these milkweeddependent butterflies. Recently, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service proposed to list these creatures under the Endangered

Monarchs have a classic migration from northern latitudes to overwintering southern latitudes takes several generations to complete. Their affiliation for milkweed plants as both nectar sources and host plants for caterpillars, is a reason to promote growing or protecting milkweed patches.

Watching a western tiger swallowtail, named for its tiger-like stripes and forked tails, I float through a mountain meadow is a fun experience. These large butterflies float on long wings, dipping and fluttering with the wind. Greenish Blue Their long wing projections



or tails are intended to distract predators which might strike the tails but miss the body. These butterflies nectar on a variety of wildflowers from columbines, to milkweed, to monkshood. A close relative, the anise swallowtail also inhabits southern Utah. These butterflies have heavy concentrations of black along their wing margins and lack the black streaking of the tiger swallowtails.

One challenging group of butterflies to view are the

small blues that like to "puddle" - sipping salts and minerals from wet spots on the ground. These ½-1" wide butterflies are mostly blue above, with various spotting or marks on the undersides of the wings. Artic blue, greenish blue, western pygmyblue, and others require some good looks and photos of both the top and undersides of the wings to aid in identification. Even

then, it may be too challenging to make an identification to the species level.

Several late summer wildflowers and shrubs provide abundant nectar sources for butterflies to feed on, including rabbitbrush, asters, thistles, sagebrush, yarrow, and other

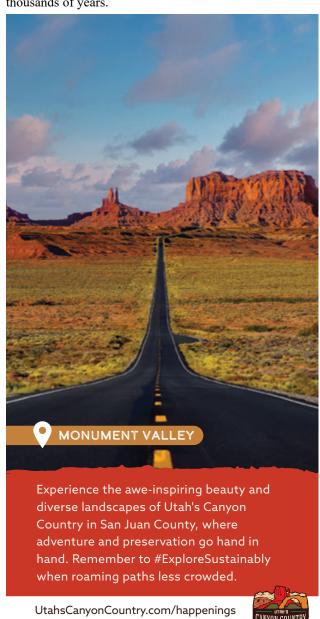

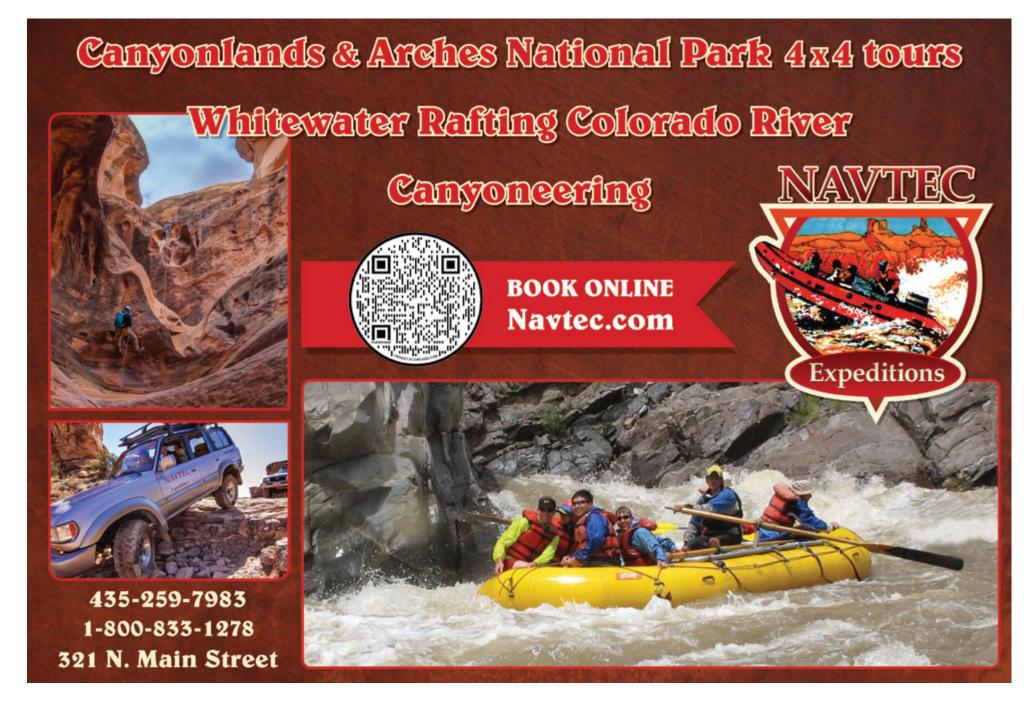
Today, Utah's Canyon Country invites exploration through a historical lens. Scenic byways like the Trail

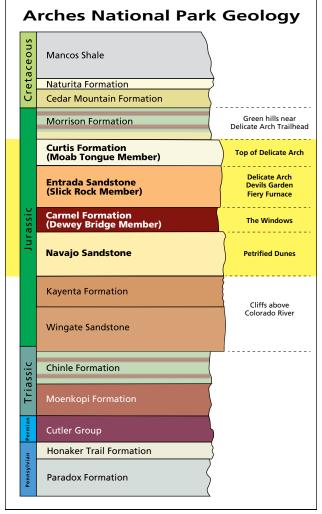

Know Your Layers — Arches Edition

One of the more striking things about Arches and Canyonlands, the two national parks close to Moab (besides of course their breath-taking beauty and overall red-rockcanyon theme), is how different they are. Each features cliffs and canyons that were formed through erosion and both are dominated by exposures of bare rock. Yet the two parks are distinct in their characteristic landforms.

One of the main reasons why the two parks each have their own unique character is that they feature different rock layers (formations to geologists). These rock layers are the building blocks of canyon country scenery. Therefore, rock units greatly impact what a landscape looks like.



A formation consists of a body of sediment that was deposited at some point in the geologic past under a specific set of environmental conditions in a particular geographic locality. A formation is composed of certain types of sediment (like sand, silt, or clay). For example, the Navajo Sandstone was deposited in an ancient sand dune field that covered much of the Four Corners region about 185 million years ago during the Jurassic Period when dinosaurs were alive. The Entrada Sandstone was deposited in a different and much smaller sand dune field that existed a bit later in time (about 159 million years ago).



Geologists spend a great deal of time studying each rock layer in detail, including its fossils and where it crops out across a geographic area, in order to understand Earth history. Fortunately for park visitors, hikers, and others out enjoying canyon country scenery, most layers have easily observable features that make them recognizable without having to undertake such scientific study. Many rock layers have characteristics that form distinctive landforms. These characteristics do relate back to their geologic history, but also can be appreciated just purely from a landscape sense.

Arches National Park contains at least 15 different rock layers. Only four make up most of the main features in the park and are responsible for most of its iconic scenery. Note that other geologic events also impact scenery. For example, the rock layers in some parts of Arches have been folded and

contain sets of parallel fractures (joints). These joints have facilitated the erosion that carved the fins (elongated rock ridges) of Devils Garden and the Fiery Furnace.

Navajo Sandstone

The Navajo Sandstone makes up some of the most compelling scenery in Utah. It is the "rock star" in Zion and Capitol Reef national parks and makes up the iconic Mesa Arch in Canyonlands. In Arches, it is mostly found in the area known as the Petrified Dunes and it has more of a supporting role in the scenery. Although the Navajo Sandstone was in fact deposited in ancient sand dunes, the rounded knobs of the Petrified Dunes were formed by erosion. The Navajo Sandstone is light yellow in color and displays a type of inclined layering known as cross bedding that formed along dune surfaces.

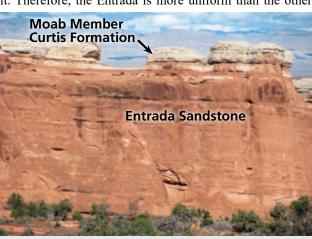
<u>Carmel Formation (Dewey Bridge Member)</u>

The Dewey Bridge Member is a unique subdivision of the Carmel Formation found only in Southeastern Utah. Its most famous exposures are in the Windows Section of Arches National Park. It is dark red to orange in color and is striking because of its contorted bedded formed by soft-sediment deformation. The conditions that caused the Dewey Bridge's beds to wrinkle while its sediments were still soft (e.g., before they were lithified) are unknown, but the wavy and uneven bedding is pervasive. Even the contact (boundary) with the overlying Entrada Sandstone shows this uneven layering.

Entrada Sandstone (Slick Rock Member)

The Entrada Sandstone has the starring role in Arches National Park. Most of the park's arches are found in this beautiful reddish-orange layer. It also makes scenic cliffs with shear walls like those in Park Avenue. Other scenic spots like Devils Garden, Delicate Arch, and the Fiery Furnace are predominantly made of the Entrada.

While also eolian (e.g., deposited in sand dunes) in origin like the Navajo, the Entrada Sandstone is also massive, meaning that it lacks pronounced layering within it. Therefore, the Entrada is more uniform than the other

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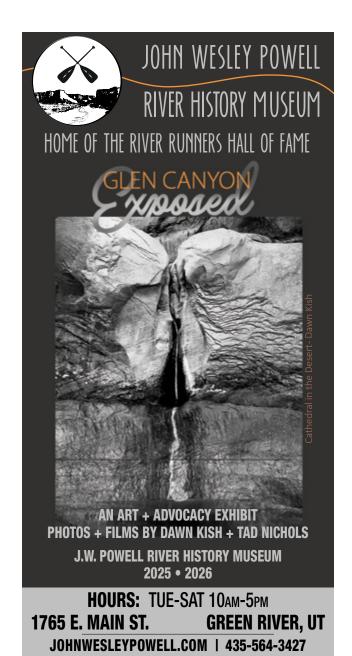


layers in Arches, which helps make it a good tableau for the weathering and erosional processes that carve natural arches. The fact that the Entrada is strong enough to hold up vertical cliffs and overhanging slopes while still eroding rather readily is also key.



Curtis Formation (Moab Member)

The Moab Member is another unique subdivision of a rock layer found (you guessed it) in the Moab area. It is also another eolian in origin but is thinner than the other prominent layers in Arches at usually less than 100 feet thick. Besides being off-white and the lightest-colored rock unit in the park, it is also harder (e.g., more resistant to erosion). It forms the hard cap rock on the top of fins in places like Devils Garden and the cap on Delicate Arch.

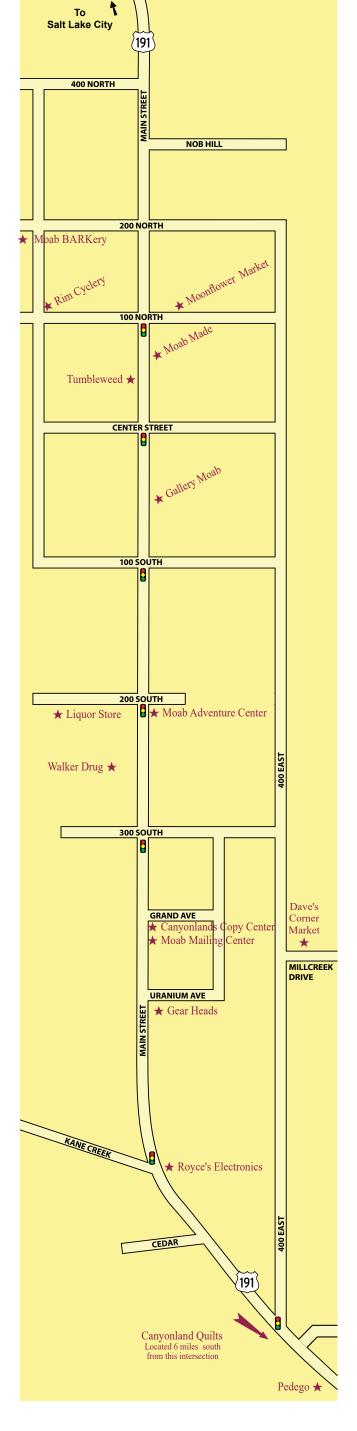

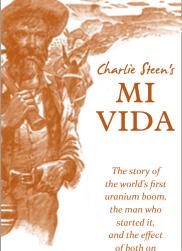

Art Happenings

Artist uses his blacksmithing skills to create artwork, that includes desert critters

Monticello artist Scott Mitchell says he became a welder in his 20s, for practical reasons before turning to the related field of blacksmithing for purely artistic endeavors. Using a hammer and anvil, Mitchell, 69, crafts snakes out of copper, as well as whimsical lizards, and occasionally spiders. He also makes sculptural wall-hangings and nighttime canyon scene paintings.



You can find Mitchell's artwork at Moab Made, 82 N. Main St. in Moab and at High Desert Café, 516 N. Main St., in Monticello. Moab Made is a shop that features the works of local artists and artisans.

Mitchell calls his artwork "house jewelry" – some of his pieces include intricate inlay work. They are small, unique works, that are popular with visitors, because they're small and easy to pack away, he said.

There's a sample of Mitchell's work at Pagan Mountaineering, 211 N. Main St., where he crafted the business's door handle in the shape of a snake.

In his nighttime canyon paintings Mitchell plays with the moonlight, by applying multiple thin layers of a glaze that allows the light to flow through differently, he said. His paintings are an acrylic-oil blend, typically.

Moab Made has been carrying Mitchell's work since the shop opened nine years ago.

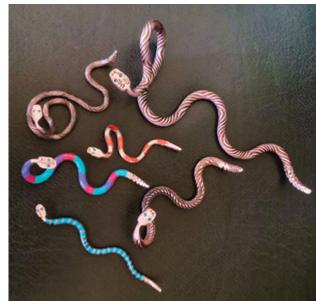
"Moab Made has been great; it's perfect for me," he said. The owner "Rebecca (McAllister) does a really good job," providing an outlet for local artists.

Artwork at Moab Made is sold on consignment which Mitchell said works well for him because he can determine his own price on items, and placing pieces on consignment allows for more creativity, by offering the opportunity to submit a one-of-a-kind "funky, one-off" type of piece, he said.

Tamar Phillips, Artist liaison for both Moab Made and Arteesian, (a second Moab shop featuring the work of local artisans) said it's always a treat to open up a new box of

creations from Mitchell. Items range from cute little copper twist micro snakes to foot-long uber-detailed, silver inlay snakes, tarantulas and lizards," she said.

And if snakes aren't your cup of tea, said Phillips, Mitchell also makes "beautiful hammered copper bracelets, original mini art,

metal-crafted wall art pieces, and even a CD of his own music," all sold at Moab Made. The CD, titled *Moon House*, is a folk-rock instrumental recording that includes flute, mandolin, guitar and drums.

The Scent of Connection

The Scent of Connection: How Your Cat Recognizes and Bonds With You Through Smell

If you've ever noticed your cat pausing to sniff your hand, your clothes, or even your face before curling up beside you, you're witnessing something much more significant than simple curiosity. These subtle behaviors are deeply rooted in the way cats experience and interact with the world, a world not dominated by sights and sounds, but by smells.

While humans rely heavily on visual and auditory cues, cats use scent as their primary language. For our feline companions, smell isn't just about detecting food or danger. It's how they identify friends, claim territory, and create lasting emotional bonds. This includes you.

Smell First, Sight Later: How Cats Identify Their Humans

Contrary to common belief, cats don't primarily recognize their humans by sight or sound. In fact, vision is one of their weaker senses when it comes to social recognition. Cats evolved as nocturnal hunters, meaning their eyes are adapted to detect movement in low light, not facial features or details. That's where their incredible sense of smell takes over.

With over 200 million olfactory receptors (compared to just 5 million in humans), cats navigate the world through scent. When your cat sniffs your hand or leans in to smell your shirt, they're not just being affectionate, they're identifying you, affirming your bond, and finding comfort in your presence.

The Science Behind Your Cat's Sniffing Habits

Recent research from Tokyo University of Agriculture has provided scientific confirmation of what many cat lovers already suspected: cats have powerful scent memories. In one study, 30 domestic cats were presented with scent samples from their owners and from strangers. The cats consistently spent more time investigating unfamiliar scents, suggesting they instantly recognized their owners' scent and found it familiar and safe.

Interestingly, the study also observed how cats used their nostrils differently depending on the scent's familiarity. When exposed to a new smell, cats led with their right nostril. As the scent became more familiar, they shifted to using the left. This nostril-switching is believed to reflect how the brain processes emotional information, with novel stimuli being handled by the right hemisphere (via the left nostril) and familiar, comforting stimuli by the left hemisphere (via the right nostril).

Sniffing Styles and Feline Personality

Just like people, not all cats behave the same way and their sniffing habits might even give you insight into their personality. In the same study, male cats with more neurotic tendencies were found to sniff obsessively and repeatedly, while more laid-back cats sniffed in a gentler, more methodical manner.

By observing how your cat investigates the world (and you), you might learn more about their emotional state and temperament. Is your cat a calm sniffer or a compulsive one? It could say a lot about how they're feeling.

Will My Cat Remember Me After Time Apart?

One common worry among cat parents is whether their pet will remember them after time apart; whether for vacation, a move, or an extended absence. Fortunately, the answer is a resounding yes.

Cats possess both short-term and long-term memory. While their short-term memory may only last hours for trivial things, their long-term memory is surprisingly strong, especially when tied to emotional experiences. If your scent is associated with feeding, cuddling, and comfort, it becomes embedded in your cat's memory. Even after weeks or months apart, most cats will still recognize and respond to your unique scent.

Why Your Cat Rubs on You: Scent Marking as Affection

When your cat rubs their cheeks or flanks against your legs, hands, or face, they're doing more than asking for pets, they're marking you. Cats have scent glands in various parts of their body, including the cheeks, forehead, and paws. By rubbing on you, they're transferring their scent to you and mixing it with yours. It's their way of claiming you as part of their world.

This behavior strengthens social bonds, not just between cats but also between cats and their humans. In feline terms, it's a loving gesture, an olfactory hug that says, "You belong to me."

Do Cats Recognize Our Voices Too?

Yes, but not in the way dogs do. Studies show cats can distinguish their owner's voice from that of a stranger and even tell when you're speaking directly to them. However, they may not respond visibly or come when called, simply because they're less socially dependent than dogs.

Still, your voice plays a role in your cat's emotional world. Combined with your scent, it helps create a sensory identity that your cat associates with safety and comfort.

$How \ to \ Strengthen \ the \ Scent \ Bond \ With \ Your \ Cat$

Understanding the role of scent in your relationship with your cat can help you deepen your bond. Here are a few tips:

- Leave behind a familiar scent when traveling: A worn T-shirt, pillowcase, or blanket can comfort your cat while you're away.
- Avoid strong, artificial smells: Perfumes, chemical cleaners, and scented candles can disrupt your cat's ability to recognize you. Stick to unscented or mild products when possible.
- Encourage scent-sharing behaviors: Let your cat rub against you freely. Don't discourage this, it's part of how they bond and communicate.

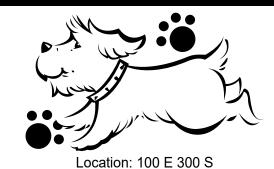
A Silent but Strong Bond
